## **News from the Social Justice Council**

Update: How Might We More Directly Support the UU Urban Ministry (UUUM)? — We are excited that so many of you stayed after our



worship service on March 7 with the Rev. Mary Margaret Earl, Executive Director of UUUM. We learned how the Urban Ministry is managing during the pandemic and began to explore ways we at Old Ship might be more involved. This is one of the ways we are discussing how to be engaged more deeply and directly in antiracism work. We have decided a first step once we are able to engage in person with the UUUM will be to arrange for a tour of its campus in Roxbury. Who doesn't love field trips?! Stay tuned for details when we are free from COVID-19 restrictions.

During the discussion, we learned the Urban Ministry has a program where a suburban UU congregation arranges a Zoom program with an artist of color and makes available opportunities to purchase art from that specific artist. We are working on participating in this program here at Old Ship. We know from past experience how much our community supports artists and their works. So again, stay tuned for more details as we make these arrangements.

Fair Foods Update — Before the pandemic, several Old Shippers participated in the Fair Foods distribution at the UUUM. Fair Foods is no longer holding a packaging and distribution event at UUUM. And Fair Foods has had to adopt new procedures due to COVID 19. However, Fair Foods is still packaging and distributing food throughout the Boston area. Current procedures require volunteer groups to contact Fair Foods directly rather than just showing up to a site. This helps ensure that they have an exact count of people that will be working with them. Additionally, the First Parish Church of Dorchester is no longer a bag assembly site, though it is currently open for the purchase of bags from 2:00 to 4:00 pm every Friday afternoon. **Special Plate Collection for April: SOLA** — We have decided to support SOLA, a boarding school in Afghanistan, for our April special plate collection. The founder of SOLA, Shabana Basij-Rasikh, spoke at one of our Meeting House Forums a couple of years ago. She is an advocate for girls' education in Afghanistan and globally. She grew up under Taliban rule but managed to get an education at great

risk to her and her family, and was able to go to Middlebury for college. After graduating, she went back to Afghanistan to found SOLA as a way to help her country, its women, and all Afghans. SOLA is a boarding school in Kabul for about 80 girls from all over Afghanistan, many from Taliban controlled areas where girls are not allowed to be educated. Roughly 63% of Afghan girls are illiterate. SOLA's website describes the school and Shabana. There is a page there which describes how donations can pay for tuition, security, books, etc. You can also find some videos on the school. Shabana, her faculty, the students, and their families are all very brave, and their stories are compelling. Shabana will join us for our April 4 worship service. She will speak briefly about SOLA before the offering and she will join us for our coffee hour time after the service to answer questions about her school and its accomplishments. This seems to us to be an important time to support the education of girls in Afghanistan.

Our congregation has been incredibly generous with our special plate collections this year--and this is a year where the needs of the organizations we support has also been great! THANK YOU ALL!

Have you heard about the 8th Principle Project? — There is a group of UUs proposing a new 8th Principle for our statement of UU Principles. Here is the text of the proposed 8th Principle: "We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions." We are considering this as a possible focus for our social justice work at Old Ship. We will be sponsoring a forum later this spring on this topic.
