Honduras Hopes is the February Special Plate Collection Recipient.

Last year, we heard from Hingham residents Peter and Kathy Swanson, who are board members of Honduras Hopes, a New Hampshire based non-profit that works on issues related to health, education, and entrepreneurship in rural Honduras. (Some Old Shippers have purchased baskets made by women in one of the organization's empowerment programs). The community supported by Honduras Hopes has been especially hard hit by two hurricanes that hit the country in a two week period and by COVID-19. We decided to support this organization again this year, given its importance to the lives of the people it serves and the crisis in which it now confronts. Thanks for your support of our special collections this church year. We have donated a total of \$6573.01 to the UUSC's Guest at Your Table Program (December Special Plate), \$2,229.37 to the Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore (November Special Plate), and \$1925 to the Hingham Food Pantry (October Special Plate). We also collected \$3144.44 at our Christmas Eve offering to be shared equally between Wellspring, UU Urban Ministry, and UUSC. We are deeply appreciative of all of these donations to continue our support of social justice work during the pandemic!

Hingham Food Pantry

The food pantry continues to collect non-perishable food items on the following dates: Monday, February 1 and 15, from 2:30-4 p.m. and Wednesday, February 3 and 17, from 12:30-2 p.m. General food items needed include cookies, granola bars, canned beef stew, canned spaghetti, tuna, pasta sauce, white rice, mac & cheese, and hearty canned soups. Donations also can be dropped off at Stop and Shop (large bin located at the front of the store).

Thank You to our Father Bill's Cooking Teams

The six teams of volunteers from Old Ship and the surrounding community have continued to "Serve Others" throughout this pandemic year by providing nutritious meals for the residents at the Father Bill's Shelter in Quincy. With COVID-19 social distancing protocols, the Father Bill's is providing shelter for 60 adults experiencing homelessness along with 3 meals each day. Due to COVID-19, the teams can no longer meet at the shelter and serve their meal and instead are dropping off enough food for 120. The shelter is able to use the extra a lunch that week. For the team members who are working at home alone to prepare the meals, the smiles and big Thank You from the shelter cook say how much the efforts (and delicious meals) of the cooking teams are appreciated in these difficult times.

Currently our six teams are well staffed but if a family wants to help out, Father Bill's can always use donations of 30 bagged lunches.
