November Special Plate: Friends of the Homeless of the South

Shore: November's special plate will provide the funds for the annual holiday dinner for the families served by the Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore (FHSS). This dinner is returning this December for the first time since 2019; it was canceled in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID. As you may recall, we at Old Ship purchase and prepare the food for the dinner. Any funds remaining after purchase food and other dinner supplies will be given to FHSS to meet their needs in serving their clients.

Remember, you also may make your special plate donation <u>online</u> through the Old Ship web site by designating your donation to FHSS or by sending your check to the church office, payable to Old Ship, with FHSS designated on the memo line. Thank you in advance for your donations!

Additional Opportunities to Support FHSS: At the time of this newsletter, we are planning to host the annual dinner in December for the families served by the FHSS, but we do not have an exact date yet. We will be needing people to cook and to serve the dinner. When we did this before COVID, we cooked dishes in our homes and brought the food to Fellowship Hall. Some food was kept warm in crock pots. We will share the details in the weekly newsletters as we have them. Stay tuned! This is a really fun event and the families served by FHSS are grateful for this holiday celebration!

We are also planning to participate again in the holiday gift program from FHSS that provides gifts for families in their shelter, or families recently relocated to permanent homes. We will be providing gifts for 10 families, as we did last year. Again, stay tuned to the weekly newsletter for details. We should have the details shortly before Thanksgiving. Cooks needed for Father Bill's Cooking Teams: As you may know, Old Ship is part of an effort on the South Shore to provide meals to Father Bill's shelter in Quincy. We staff 6 cooking/serving teams that provide meals throughout the year. Each team is assigned 4 dates to cook; it is now possible to serve the meal on your assigned dates if you would like, but it is not required. You will be provided with a recipe and amounts of ingredients needed to make your team's entrée or the salad. If you cannot be present on the date of the meal, it is possible to cook beforehand and freeze your entree. The teams currently needing cooks provide meals on four Thursdays of the year, one each quarter.
