## **News from the Social Justice Council**

The next SJC Meeting will be on Saturday, October 30 at 9 a.m. on Zoom. All are welcome to join us in supporting social justice service and action at Old Ship. Please contact <u>Davalene Cooper</u> for the Zoom meeting link if you are not already a member of the SJC.

October Special Plate Collection — Due to the emergency need for funds to help resettle evacuees from Afghanistan, we have moved Free. (which we had announced as our October special plate in last month's newsletter) to a later month in the church year. Instead, for this month, we are designating the Afghan Evacuee Resettlement Program of the International Institute of New England (IINE) as the recipient of our special plate. We have supported IINE in past years, and their work continues to be important in helping refugees become part of our Massachusetts and New Hampshire communities. In 2019, IINE offered humanitarian relief, English language learning. employment, skills training, and citizenship programs to more than 2500 people from 102 different countries. At present, IINE is preparing to assist 150 Afghans in making a new home in our area. The goal of the program is to move newly arrived evacuees from total insecurity to stability through a year long program of support and assistance, all while contending with language and cultural barriers. This is a very important time for us to support those who have had to flee Afghanistan and it is why the SJC has selected IINE as our October recipient of our special plate. Winter Coat Drive for Afghan Evacuees -- The 5th Annual Winter Coat Drive to benefit evacuees, refugees, and recent immigrants is starting next Sunday, Oct 2 at Atlantic Bagel in Hingham!!! Please drop off your gently used winter coats, boots and gloves for both children and adults in the box inside the door. These articles will be distributed to Afghan evacuees and other Immigrants who are being resettled in the Boston area by the International Institute of New England (IINE). The coat drive will run from Sunday Oct 3 to Sunday, Oct 10. Thank You in advance for your generous donations.

Hingham Food Pantry — We are again collecting non-perishable, unopened, and unexpired food for the Hingham Food Pantry as part of our Sunday morning worship service. There is a basket in the vestibule for donations. Donations may also be left in the bins in the vestibule of the Parish House (front door) anytime the office is open. Donations may also be made at the Hingham Stop and Shop (large bin at the front of the store). Although all donations are appreciated, the food pantry reports that the following items are most needed at this time: rice side dishes, canned fruit, cookies, granola or cereal bars, and 1 or 2 pound bags of sugar (larger sizes are not needed). The food pantry is especially grateful for the support of the community since the start of the pandemic and the support from Old Ship members and friends. Checks
