

May Musings [Physician-assisted death] Rev. Edmund Robinson

A few in this congregation are interested in supporting a piece of legislation now making its way through the legislature, to provide medical assistance in dying for terminally ill people faced with the prospect of great pain and suffering. I am glad to encourage this interest because UUs tend to have a practical approach to terminal suffering,



and so many other religious groups just reflexively oppose anyone "playing God" with death.

But I don't think it is very productive to use the word "suicide" in connection with medical care in the final days. We had a talk in the local interfaith clergy group about suicide as a social problem, but the more we discussed it, the more it seemed to be multiple problems. In other words, we might set out with the best of intentions trying to make sure anyone who was contemplating taking his or her own life had access to phone counseling. But suppose it turned out that there were different demographics for different suicides. There might be one pattern for teenage boys and another pattern for middle-aged men and another pattern for teenage girls or people with substance abuse problem. And someone contemplating taking their own life because of the breakup of a marriage or firing from a job presents a very different state of mind from someone who wants to short-circuit his suffering in the last stages of an aggressive cancer.

My father ended his own life at age 61, when I was 27. He did not consult any family members before he did the act. Had I been aware of his intentions, I would have made every effort to talk him out of it. It is deeply disturbing to me still, 40 years later.

In short, I am in favor of active suicide prevention in a community, in hotlines to discuss personal problems. But I am also in favor of giving terminally ill patients under carefully controlled circumstances the option to have medical assistance in hastening their death.

May Board of Trustees Updates

The Board of Trustees (BOT) met on April 2nd and April 9th this month for business meetings. Below are some notable items not discussed elsewhere in the newsletter.

Minister Emeritus Article: Longtime members Joan Wilson and Fan Leonard have submitted



an article proposing emeritus status be granted to Rev. Ken Read-Brown. Per Old Ship bylaws, this article will be voted on at the Annual Meeting. An information meeting on this article led by Joan and Fan was held on April 7.

Ministry Search Team (MST): Our church profile has been published on the UUA site in preparation of ministerial candidates expressing interest. The MST expects to interview candidates in early May. We hope a new minister will be chosen by mid-May.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jack Gomez shared that we are on pace to end the fiscal year with a surplus of about \$30,000 - \$40,000 mostly due to no Religious Education expenses. Overall, we have a surplus of \$245,000, \$100,000 of this is considered our rainy-day fund. At the January BOT meeting, Treasurer Gomez proposed reducing the number of banking relationships we have. He suggested closing the line of credit we had with Eastern Bank and this is in process. Jack has applied for a similar line of credit at Rockland Trust and that process is ongoing and he is waiting for approval. The line of credit can be used if we need money in a hurry.

Capital Campaign Committee Formed: In the April 2nd meeting, it was proposed that a capital campaign fundraising committee be established. That capital campaign committee needs to be able to tell people what their donation will be put towards and that info is not available yet. In the April 9th meeting, the BOT agreed to form a committee initially composed of Elaine Gomez, Nina Wellford, and Jack Gomez. The BOT will provide oversight over the committee. The Capital Campaign Committee will also coordinate with the building team. It was agreed that the committee should begin to raise money after the vote to build the new building has been taken.

Critical Projects for the Meeting House: On April 11th the BOT discussed Phase 1 (critical and immediate) and Phase 2 (less urgent) projects as described by the building committee. The Phase 1 Critical projects (necessary in the next 12 months) include an upgrade to the Audio Visual (AV) system and plaster repair within the Meeting House. Very rough estimates indicate these two projects would total approximately \$65,000. Ron Pollara and Tom Willson are working on getting firm estimates. There is \$26,000 sitting in an account from surplus and that money can be used to cover those costs. The money in the budget from this year and next could be added to cover the complete costs. Phase 2 projects can be delayed to subsequent years. \$20,000 in building maintenance is required each year but we can't afford that. It was suggested we think about tapping the endowment to address these critical Meeting House projects.

Board & Nominating Committee Downsizing Article: As there has been continued difficulty filling open Board and Nominating Committee positions, the BOT has proposed that the number of elected members on both the Board of Trustees and the Nominating Committee be reduced. Also, as no youth have volunteered to serve on the BOT in the last several years, the BOT propose to removing the requirement of a seat to be held a youth member on the BOT. It was acknowledged that youth in our congregation may still become board members if they are members of the church and this is described elsewhere in the bylaws (they are at least 16 years of age (14 if the student has completed the Coming-of-Age program.) It was proposed that the by-laws be amended to read as follows:

First Parish Hingham By-laws Article V, Sec 1(h), shall be amended to require a reduction in the number of Board Trustees-at-large from five to three.

First Parish Hingham By-laws Article V, Sec. 1 (j) and Article V, Sec 3 (f) shall be amended to require a reduction in the number of members on the Nominating Committee from five to three.

A warrant article including these changes will be drafted and voted on at the annual meeting. Also discussed was continuing to require a quorum of 5 board members be present to hold a board meeting and also require 4 votes to pass a motion.
