#### Minister's musings for June, 2024 Rev. Edmund Robinson

Lines I wish I had written: "And what is so rare as a day in June? Then, if ever, come perfect days Heaven tries earth if it be in tune, And over it softly her warm ear lays."



Those lines are from a longer poem by James Russell

Lowell, a bucolic idyll entitled "The Vision of Sir Launfal," which is rarely quoted in full. As June is my birth month, (as well as the birth month of my son and grandson and my wedding anniversary with Jacqueline) I am partial to this description of its sweet splendor. The idea that a month could be "in tune" and the heaven is the tuner, laying her (heaven is female! who knew?) warm ear over it.

Lowell's lines have echoes of the Pythagoreans, a sect of pre-Socratic philosophers of ancient Greece. Ancient observers of the heavens had noted that the position of the stars was generally fixed. They made up certain constellations and the shape of those constellations was the same from night to night. But then there were three other types of heavenly bodies which seemed to come and go on different schedules: the sun, the moon and the five visible planets.

The Pythgoreans were very interested in music, and it was they who discovered that if you pluck a vibrating string you will get a note of a certain pitch, and if you stop the vibrating halfway up the length of the string, it will give you a note that is exactly an octave higher than the first one. They put music and astronomy together in a theory that all the heavenly bodies were on nested glass spheres which rotated across the sky at different rates. The fixed stars were the outermost bowl and then there was one bowl for each planet, one for the sun and one for the moon. Each bowl had a god or goddess sitting on it and singing, each in a different pitch, the way a glass will resonate if you rub it on the rim. Part of the Pythagoreans' musical training was trying to sit still enough to hear this "Music of the Spheres," and that is what I think of when I read Lowell's lines about June.

#### **Board of Trustees June Update**

The Board of Trustees met on May 2nd for our monthly business meeting. Also on May 19th, the Board oversaw our Annual Parish Meeting. Below are some items to note from those meetings and other updates not discussed elsewhere.



**Budget Deficit:** As of May 26th, we have 95 pledges for FY 2024/2025 totaling \$252,809. A \$290,000 budget was approved at Annual Meeting on May 19. As a deficit is likely, the Board will meet in special session later next month to discuss options going forward.

**The Building Committee**: Building committee members Tom Willson and Nina Wellford attended on May 2nd with an update on the following items:

- Friends of the Old Ship Meeting House will become a member-based organization as of June 2024. Benefits of membership include knowledge that they are supporting Old Ship Meeting House, a free tour and a packet of Old Ship note cards.
- Redoing the Sound system is on the list of phase 1 of building projects. We need a sound system that has microphones, zoom capabilities, and a hearing aid system. The majority portion of the cost estimated at \$40,000 of this will be covered by grants.
- An anonymous donor has offered a generous donation toward a new heating system for the meeting house. Donor will fund a study of HVAC options for the meeting house heating repairs. It will be determined if it is more cost effective to have two independent heating systems for the Meeting House and the Community Building or a larger combined system.
- Plaster in the alcove needs fixing. More water damage in the front left of the sanctuary needs repairing. This is not covered by a grant. The cost of plaster repairs will likely be less than 25K so no Parish Vote approval will be needed.
- Our church insurance company wants us to put in a shut off valve for the water that comes into the building from the street. Repair is needed of the old rusty pipe that comes from the street. This needs to be considered a phase 1 high priority repair.

**Nurturing Community Committee:** Nurturing Community member Diane Elliott spoke at the May 2 meeting. Diane proposed that the Worship and Music Committee and the Nurturing Community Committee work together next year. Both committee need more members to function effectively.

#### May 19th Annual Meeting

#### Board & Nominating Committee Downsizing Approved: The parish

approved changes to our bylaws articles to reduce the size of our Board of Trustees to seven members and the Nominating Committee to three members. Also approved was a change to no longer specifically require a youth member on the Board of Trustees. We note that this does not preclude a youth member from being elected.

**Elected Positions:** The parish elected the following members for the 2024-2025 church year:

Board of Trustees: President: Trish McAleer, Vice President: Janice McPhillips,Treasurer: Clayton Handleman Clerk: Elaine Cusker, Trustees At-Large: Karen Churchill, Dennis Hogan, Cory Fitz-Marquez Nominating Committee; Susannah Thomas, Joan Wilson and Dana Kintigh. Collector: Rich Elliott, Assistant Collector: Eric Espinosa Trustees of Invested Funds: Mike Dwyer, Craig Russ, Janet Asnes, Ralph Brown and David Murphy.

**Emeritus Article Approved:** The congregation unanimously approved bestowing Rev. Ken Read-Brown with Minister Emeritus status. Rev. Ken's Designation will become formal in August. Look for information on a parish celebration to honor Rev. Emeritus Read-Brown this fall.

**Endorsement of UUA Article 2:** The parish voted to encourage our 3 delegates to the UUA General Assembly, held virtually this year, to vote "Yes" on the proposed changed to Article 2 of the UUA bylaws.

#### **Community Space Team**

The Community Space Building Committee is in discussions with the architects and civil engineers who responded to the RFPs with the aim of clarifying the specifics of their responses and selecting one of each for Phase 1 — Pre-Design / Design Concepts and Drawings for



Owner Approval. The committee is then aiming to make a proposal to the Old Ship Board at their June meeting and, if approved, to contract with the chosen architect and engineer soon thereafter. The objective of Phase 1 is for the architect and engineer to prepare enough of a conceptual plan, along with preliminary drawings, over the summer for the committee to present them to the congregation for a vote in September/October in the hopes of gaining approval to move forward with the detailed design and construction."
