Let September be an invitation to CONNECTION * RECONNECTION * DISCONNECTION. A month of opportunities to explore the ways we connect with ourselves, each other, the world around us, and something beyond us.

On September 8^{th,} we will join countless Unitarian Universalists across the nation in the Water Communion Ceremony. Also known as In-gathering Sunday - an intentional moment to connect and reconnect with each other and to that which matters most. In the gathering up our individual lives through a collective experience, symbolized by water, we are reminded we need one another.

As you gather up a vial of water to bring to this service, I invite you to ponder four things. First, Where does your water come from? What is the geographic location? Second, What is the source of your water? Is it your home tap water, a river, lake? Third, the spiritual significance of this moment, Why that moment matters to you? What makes it meaningful? How is it spiritually grounding for you and your loved ones? And finally, What is your hope for First Parish in the coming year?

In the service, we will write a note about the four items (location, source, significance, hopes) then offer our water in silence. I will gather up yours notes and craft liturgy (chalice lightings, prayers, blessings, closing words) to be used throughout the month. Your individual experiences and hopes will bless our sacred gatherings reminding us of our commitment to the wellbeing of the congregation.

Our month will close with our sacred waters being used to bless Rev. Ken Read-Brown at the Minister Emeritus celebration on September 29th. In this moment of reconnection, we will celebrate his new relationship with Old Ship. May we be reminded Minister Emeritus is a ceremonial title with no responsibilities or expectations. As such, we also celebrate his new chapter and covenant to honor his new commitments, new adventures, and expanded time with family.

This month is also a time of beginnings. An invitation to nurturing and cultivating connection in our shared ministry. As your contract ministry, I hold many responsibilities and accompanying expectations. The least of which includes worship leadership, pastoral care, embodied social justice practices, and ministerial presence with church governance. No doubt it will be a busy year. I will be with you in humble imperfection while striving for excellence in ministry. We will have moments where we are connected with like minds and celebrating welcomed outcomes. And, no doubt we will also have moments of being disappointed with choices and living in the tension of different ideologies. In all of these moments may we remember the month of September and the grounding philosophy of water communion. We are stronger together. We are committed to the wellbeing of First Parish.

May we be reminded of Unitarian Universalist values to keep Love at the

center.

May we remember to play together, laugh often, express gratitude, share our grief, explore disappointment, and stay curious.

May our hearts and minds stay open to new and novel ideas.

And, may we hold space to celebrate and bless each other along the way.

PRACTICALLY SPEAKING - HOW TO CONNECT WITH REV. CARIE

I am available by phone and email for church business and pastoral calls. I check my email several times a day. If you don't hear from me in a couple days, feel free to give me a nudge. I **prefer not to use text** for church business. All too often I lose sight of text messages as they are not easily flagged for follow-up. Feel free to use text for last minute logistics, urgent needs, and emergencies.

Feel free to stop by during office hours on Thursday afternoon or set up an appointment. I will be in Hingham 2-3 days per week. You can anticipate that I will be in the Hingham on Thursdays, and Sundays when I am leading service. My third Hingham day will be flexible to the needs of the community and my personal life.

My regular day off will be Monday. I do not respond to communications or schedule meetings on my day off unless it is an emergency.

Friday is my writing day. I do not schedule meetings though I'm happy to pause for communications.

Here's the two things about my cell phone. First, I do not have my professional email connected to my phone. This is how I breathe life, take space, and seek balance in ministry. Second, I use Verizon. As many of you already know, I have inconsistent cell phone connectivity in the office and in downtown Hingham. Wifi helps but is not dependable. Please keep this in mind if you are trying to reach me for an emergency. If I have not responded promptly to a pastoral emergency, please send an email and call the church office.

Board of Trustees September Update

The Board of Trustees met on August 8th for our monthly business meeting. Below are items discussed but not noted elsewhere in the newsletter.

Meeting House security: In light of recent vandalism at other progressive religious



communities in Massachusetts, Elaine Cusker contacted the Hingham Police Chief and Tom Willson from the Facilities' Committee regarding safety for Meeting House. The HPD will increase patrols of our property and welcomed any future conversation about security concerns. Tom Willson consulted with our current security company. Though security cameras have been considered they have been determined presently as not the best investment for our security. The Board will share more detailed information regarding improvements and costs when it is ready.

Building Committee: Janice McPhillips reported on recent activity on the Building Committee. Plaster Repair: Tom Willson has found a plasterer that can do the work. Sound System: The system will not be able to be installed in time for the Ken Burns lecture so a temporary alternative will be installed. HVAC: An anonymous donor has provided funds for the investigation of an environmentally sound heating system for new building and meetinghouse. Pew Cleaning: This is being undertaken by a volunteer group every Tuesday. Anyone is welcome to join. Inspections: The season is coming up for different agents to inspect the furnace, fire detection and sprinkler system, as well as occupancy requirements of the town. A front door issue will be addressed by the sexton. Water Line Replacement: The current supply system was installed in 1800's and upgraded in 1920's. Happily, it is now known that the issue is not urgent and that Tom Willson has found someone able to work on it.

Treasurer's report: Treasurer Clayton Handleman reported the following; Breeze Account Pledge Billing: Some congregants were getting charged multiple times in Breeze. This is being addressed and corrected in the church office. Treasurer Change Over: There are no written procedures for changing over to a new Treasurer or new officers which actually includes notification to the Secretary of State of the Commonwealth. Clayton is working on this. The process involves the Clerk. Clayton will follow-up as needed. Bank Accounts: Clayton is working on consolidating the Old Ship bank accounts (now in four separate banks) and also looking at how to insure all cash is invested for some return. Budget recap: Clayton explained some of the categories of the budget for Rev. Carie's benefit. A discussion followed about our Religious Education program and possibly using surpluses to close a 50K shortfall in the pledges. Board President Trish McAleer will call for Zoom meeting in early September for congregation members to talk about the Religious Education Program. This will be followed by a larger fall congregational meeting on the budget and the RE ambitions this fall.

Website project update; Janice McPhillips advised that there is a project team composed of Janice, David Murphy, Nina Wellford, Ralph Brown, and Paul Stone. The team has been working on various tasks and providing their input. Our website consultant is working on a mock-up of the website. This

should be ready before the current site requires renewal. When the site is available for viewing in a test mode, many will be invited to review it.

Ministerial Start Up Program: With the intention of providing the best support for our current minister, The Board and Rev Carie have agreed to participate in the UUA facilitated Ministerial Start Up Program. The program takes part in two stages with the first gathering set for the evening of Sept. 19. A second follow up session will be scheduled for this winter. It was noted that this program will take the place of the NER Board retreats this fall.

Missing Member Outreach: There was a brief discussion regarding contacting church members unseen over the past year and encouraging their return to our community. A meeting on this has been scheduled for August 29 at 11:00 am at 14 Main.

Display of Flags: Following inquiry from a member, Elaine Cusker requested clarification of policy regarding when Old Ship displayed the Pride and Black Lives Matter flags/banners. It was agreed that these flags should be displayed continuously and regardless of an uptick in threats. If Meeting House tour guides exchange the Pride Flag for the Open Flag on Tour Days, they will be asked to put the Pride flag back at the end of the shift.
