Rev. Carie responds to frequently asked questions.

Will you be publishing your sermons?

I do not have a print sermon for distribution. I lead services from notes. Preaching extemporaneously allows me to move with Spirit and respond in real time to the community. I find I am able to convey the message more authentically and meaningfully when preaching extemporaneously. This allows me to be more connected to the gathered community rather than a written text in front of me. The downside is there is no well-crafted sermon to distribute for those who are absent or wish to return to what they heard and experienced.

Will you be uploading services on YouTube services?

I do not upload Sunday recorded services on YouTube. The practice of honoring the music and written work of musicians and authors is essential to being in right relationship and respecting creators professional contributions and financial livelihood. While First Parish in Hingham has obtained some licensure and copyright permission for specific bodies of music, we do not have general copyright for the various authors whose written work we engage on Sunday morning. Let me begin by reiterating what you may have heard me say before, "I am glad to be here with the good people of First Parish in Hingham responding to the call of contract ministry." These first couple months have been about getting to know all of you, building trust, witnessing your ministries, leading worship, and affirming the grace and complexity of

This year, I have purchased the music and worship membership. This membership is available to all the members of the Music and Worship Committee. The 2024/25 overarching theme "The Practices of our Faith" is a way for us to connect to our <u>new UU core value of Liberating Love</u> with each of our monthly themes framed as a practice that helps us embody liberating love in our daily lives.

By the Way, this overarching theme also aligns with the Life Learning course I will be facilitating with Rich Elliott. The course "Love At The Center: Living our UU Values" will be offered on the Second Sundays November to June from 12:30 – 2:30. I hope you will join us.

The Soul Matters October theme is *Living Love Through the Practice DEEP LISTENING.* A topic that seems quite timely as we move into new ministries together amid the complicated state of our nation and global communities. In the spirit of this month's theme*DEEP LISTENING*, I invite you to walk with these questions:

- Where do you engage the best practices of listening? Reflect on what makes you a good listener in these spaces? How might you apply your best practices to more complicated relationships?
- Looking through a lens of <u>cultural competence</u>, where do you have the most room to grow in ease of relationships?
- What wisdom from your beloved ancestors guides your living? If you consulted them today, what wise counsel might they offer?
- Consider this congregations past and present journey with multiple

worship leaders both lay and professional. How do you stay open to the message? Where, when, and why do you shut down or get critical? How might you listen to spirit calling you forward?

I encourage you to reflect on these questions, explore them in your family and friend circle, engage them in church groups. You may notice I offer one for each week and they align with the worship services.

Let's talk TRANSITION MINISTRY

This coming year, with Rev Carie as our Contract Minister, we have an excellent opportunity to use the time to move forward intentionally - recognizing that we are at a threshold, entering/evolving into a new stage of "*Old Ship*."

As our contract minister, Carie falls under what we in Unitarian Universalism call transitional ministry. This is an umbrella term for interim, contract and developmental ministries. Beyond the expectations laid out in our contract (worship, pastoral care, life



learning class, and leadership support), the transitional minister's role includes supporting and serving as consultant during the time between settled ministers.

Several of you have asked Carie, "Can't you be our settled minister?" The answer is: nothing prohibits this option, <u>however</u>, it is considered wise to engage in a journey of being present in this moment and exploring the future of Old Ship before we consider that question. It is prudent to wait till at least the second year of a contract ministry to engage in this question.

In times of transition, the questions – who we are without our former minister, what is our unique ministry or mission, and how shall we go forward – are fundamental to a congregation. One key component in the transition process is the task of exploring these questions with a <u>Transition Team</u>. This specific group is charged with only one agenda as follows:

To assist the Contract Minister<u>and</u> the congregation as we seek to use the time between settled ministers effectively. The transition team advises and consults with the transitional minister on a regular basis, communicates and bears witness to the fact that transition is ultimately the work of the congregation, and must be available to hear the concerns of members of the congregation (See Transition Team: A Tool for Interim Ministry)

This transitional team will be a group of 4-6 people. The team should be reflective of the congregation's demographics and social identities. Most importantly Team members are members who are willing and able to listen to a cross section of the congregation without preconceived bias or becoming defensive. They are widely trusted and able to "Speak the Truth in Love" They attend church regularly and demonstrate an ongoing commitment to our congregation and its future. They bring a sense of creativity and openness



to change. With this description, one or more people are probably coming to your mind right now and we'd love to hear about them .

Identifying members and assembling the team is the work of a small group of leaders: Carie Johnson, Contract Minister, Corey Fitz-margues, Board of Trustees, Judi Flaherty, Committee on Ministry and YOU! The process begins with each of us reflecting on the qualifications and making suggestions. You will be invited to suggest members, possibly yourself or another member. You do not need to get permission for others to nominate others. We will receive the suggestions and explore willingness. From these suggestions a Transition Team is organized with an eye toward diversity, cohesiveness, and congregational trust. The congregation will ultimately commission the group with a charge to guide the transition time, engage the congregation, and communicate regularly with leaders and membership.

During the month of October, there will be opportunity for members of the congregation to ask questions in open circles on Sunday, October 6th with Judi Flaherty and Corey Fitz-Marquez and 13th with Rev. Carie, Judi and Corey. Both events will begin at 12:15 at 14 Main Street with zoom option. We will receive suggestions on Sundays or by email the first two weeks of October. The Transition Team will be announced in November with a commissioning of the team at the earliest possible date. Thanks for your time, energy and consideration on this matter. You are appreciated!

Opportunities this month to help those in need —We have identified two specific projects to help our neighbors in need this month. Please help as you are able with one or both of this projects.

1. Blanket Drive for the migrant families at the Quincy Welcome Center on October 6 — We are collecting NEW blankets for migrant families being served by Bay State Community Services. Bring your blanket to church on Sunday, October 6. The blankets will be delivered to Bay State the next day. If you are unable to bring your blankets to church that day, please drop them off at 14 Main before October 6. Thanks in advance for spreading warmth and love to these families.

2. **Providing "Birthday Kits" for the Hingham Food Pantry on October 20** — We are seeking to create 30 "birthday kits" for the Hingham Food Pantry. We are asking members of our community to put together a box of cake mix, a 12 ounce can of soda, and a can of frosting. Place these items in a bag and bring to church on October 20. The SJC will add candles and an aluminum baking pan. We discovered that the soda replaces the need for oil and eggs in the cake mix--and we tested this to ensure that the resulting cake was delicious (it was!). Here are the combinations of cake mix and soda to use in putting togehter your donation: Coca Cola + Chocolate Cake Mix, Sprite + Yellow Cake Mix, Dr. Pepper + Red Velvet Cake Mix, A&W Cream Soda + Vanilla Cake Mix, Barq's Root Beer + Spice Cake Mix, Canada Dry Ginger Ale + Carrot Cake Mix, Mountain Dew + Lemon Cake Mix, Fanta Strawberry + Strawberry Cake Mix, Sierra Mist + Butter Pecan Cake Mix, Pibb Xtra + Devil's Food Cake. Thanks for contributing to this project that will help our neighbors celebrate their birthdays!

UU the Vote - get involved! UU the Vote is partnering with Reclaim Our Vote of the Center for Common Ground, an organization that fights for voting rights and mobilizes communities of color. Ellie Handleman is making packets of 10, 20, or 30 postcards with all the information you need to write on them and send them out. You'll receive general instructions, instructions specific for the location you're addressing cards for, stickers you put on the cards (containing the meaty information about numbers they can call or websites they can visit to check on their voter registration, or to register), a list of addresses, and postcards. There will be a script for a sentence or so to write above the sticker, and a few phrases around the card (preferably in color). The addresses are to be hand-written on the cards. Ellie can make up packets on demand, and bring them to church - or you can pick them up at her house. Contact her at **ellie@thehandlemans.org** OR text or call (781)985-2659. Postcards need to be mailed by mid-October.

IN ADDITION, for determined and devoted souls, there is a UU the Vote phone bank every Tuesday from 7-9 p.m. through Oct. 29. There's a Zoom call to get all the instructions and support you need - then some time for making calls, then a brief re-gathering to discuss. You can stay on the Zoom call while making calls, so you won't feel (or be) alone. AND - Ellie will be on

the support team for every phone bank, so if you come you can count on seeing at least one familiar face. To register for a phone bank, go to https://sidewithlove.org/, scroll down to events, then keep scrolling until you get to an event entitled "UU the Vote 2024 Weekly Phonebank." Ellie says it's a lot more fun than it sounds like, and she'd love to see you there!



We think this is an important way to serve our Hingham neighbors in need. Donations can be made online through the Old Ship website. Click the donate button and then designate your donation for the Hingham Food Pantry. The special plate during a Sunday service will be announced in a weekly Constant Contact.

In addition to this month's special "Birthday Kt" collection, we also collect food donations for the Hingham Food Pantry each week in the Meeting House and at 14 Main; there is a basket in the vestibule for donations. Currently, the following items are especially needed for the pantry: Pasta Sauce, Mac & Cheese, Granola Bars, Canned Tuna, Cookies, Minute Rice, Noodle or Potato Side dishes, and Canned Vegetables.

Book Talk and Arts Walk at Old Ship Sunday, October 20 at 4:30 P.M.

On Sunday, October 20, Hingham will hold its annual Arts Walk, featuring artists, authors and musicians in shops and galleries throughout Hingham Square. Old Ship Meeting House will be open from noon to 4 for tours, and at 4:30 pm, Friends of Old Ship will sponsor a special Book Talk, free and open to the



public. Best-selling author and UU Julia Park Tracey will discuss *Silence: a Novel*, set in early Puritan times and based on the life of her great grandmother (x7), Silence Marsh Greenleaf. Much of the action takes place in our Meeting House, and readers will recognize landmarks in Cohasset, Hull and Hingham for the setting. Set 20 years after the witch trials, it gets into themes of women's rage, grief and silencing, all through the lens of the Puritan beliefs of the time - it's a quick and satisfying read.
