What if you didn't know when your next meal would be?



Father Bill's/Mainspring provides the answer for at least 150 people each night by serving a hot nutritious dinner to adults who are experiencing

homelessness. Old Ship works to Serve Others by coordinating 6 teams of cooks who donate the Main Dish and the Salad for some of those meals. Each team provides food once a quarter (for a total of 4 meals each year by each team) on either Monday or Thursday evenings. Current team members say it easy and fun and deeply meaningful to truly help others in such a direct and important way.

Right now one of the Thursday teams needs new cooks to make Shepherd's Pie (recipe provided). The next cooking date will be the 2nd Thursday in July (7/10), followed by the 2nd Thursday in October, January and April. You will get a recipe and instructions on what you need to buy (costs average \$50) for your donation to your team's dinner. You can join team members in helping to serve the meal in Quincy starting at 5pm, or you

may drop off your donation earlier the day of or the day before your team is providing the dinner, or ask another team member to pick up and drop off your donation.

If you are not able to help, do you know someone who might like to? Please let your friends know about the need for additional cooks. Hingham Food Pantry — As we end our church year, it would be great if we could increase our donations to the food pantry before we end our regular services in the Meeting House. Summer often finds the food pantry in need of additional donations from us as donations sometimes decline during the summer months. If possible, please donate from this list of specific foods: cookies, granola bars, minute rice and rice side dishes, crackers, pasta sauce, and 2 lb. bags of sugar. Items may be donated each week during Sunday services or dropped off anytime the office is open at 14 Main Street. There also are drop off boxes for the food pantry at Stop & Shop (near the Beal Street Entrance/Exit), at Jack Conway and at Coldwell Banker. Thanks to everyone who supports our neighbors experiencing food insecurity!

Palestine Children's Relief Fund (PCRF) Special Plate and Sermon — We are pleased to report that April's Special Plate collection for the PCRF collected \$2773.11, inclusive of a generous funds match from one of our congregants. PCRF provides humanitarian aid and free medical care to thousands of children in Gaza and the West Bank. At present, PCRF is supporting and providing aid to children in Gaza who have lost one or both parents in the war and children who have been injured themselves. You may learn more at PCRF.

Our collection was accompanied by a visit from a representative from PCRF, Eynas Jarrar, a first generation Palestinian-American with family in the West Bank, and a sermon by Rev. DL Helfer, co-author of the Unitarian Universalist Association's Action of Immediate Witness: Solidarity with Palestinians. This sermon concluded with a poem by the late Dr. Refaat Alareer, Palestinian writer, poet, translator, university professor and activist from Gaza, who was killed along with several family members in an air strike in December 2023:

If I must die

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If I must die,
you must live
to tell my story
to sell my things
to buy a piece of cloth
and some strings,
(make it white with a long tail)
so that a child, somewhere in Gaza
while looking heaven in the eye
awaiting his dad who left in a blaze-
and bid no one farewell
not even to his flesh
not even to himself–sees the kite, my kite you made, flying up above
and thinks for a moment an angel is there
bringing back love
If I must die
let it bring hope
let it be a tale
