

Everyday Ordinary Theologies...

Oh, how I do love autumn. A cup of tea, a big sweater, a cozy blanket, a good book, a cat on my lap, and a pot of soup simmer on the stove. In my world this is self-compassion at its finest!

October. The perfect month to explore what it means to cultivate compassion for one's self, family, neighbor, stranger, and friend. I offer you this excerpt from the poem "Self-Compassion" by James Crew. You can read or listen to the full poem <u>HERE</u>.

My friend and I snickered the first time we heard the meditation teacher, a grown man, call himself honey, with a hand placed over his heart to illustrate how we too might become more gentle with ourselves and our runaway minds. It's been years since we sat with legs twisted on cushions, holding back our laughter, but today I found myself crouched on the floor again, not meditating exactly, just agreeing to be still, saying honey to myself...

And this "Prayer for Cultivating Compassion for the World" from my colleague Rev. Michelle Collins.

Ground of Being, we witness a world on fire, literally and metaphorically. Headlines scream of cruelty and division. Children go hungry while others feast. The earth herself groans under the weight of our carelessness and our selfishness.

Some days the suffering feels too vast, the darkness too deep. We are tempted to close our hearts rather than let them break again and again. To choose cynicism over hope, numbness over feeling, despair over the vulnerable act of caring.

Yet here we gather, proof that love persists. In every city, on every continent, hearts like ours beat with stubborn compassion. Strangers comfort strangers. Neighbors feed neighbors. People choose justice when injustice would be easier.

Remind us that we are part of something larger than our individual capacity to heal. That every act of kindness creates ripples we'll never see. That the light of compassion, however small our flame, joins with countless others to push back the darkness.

May we trust that love is stronger than fear, that justice is more powerful than oppression, that ordinary people choosing extraordinary kindness can and will transform this world.

This month allow yourself to linger. Settle into the quiet. Select your favorite poem or poet and return often. Send me a copy. Find a good book. Consider a delicious novel to soothe the soul. Share with me the title. Enjoy the crisp air. Let your heart love what it loves.

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October Board of Trustees Update

On Wednesday, September 10, the Board met for it's monthly meeting. Below are some items to note;

Community Space Team: At the request of the Community Space Team (CST), Architect David Torrey

is working on a directional schematic design for a one-story building for the purpose of illustrating the choice between building a one-story building or a two-story building. The CST believes that the former can be built for the current \$2.5M budget and that the latter would cost \$3.2M. The team will review the design with Torrey this month and present both designs and budgets to the Board by the BOT October meeting. The CST believes that a one-story design could provide more functional space than the 14 Main St. space but would mean considerably less office, storage, and meeting space than the two-story

design. Both designs are directional but not final, useful for illustrating what the different budgets will purchase. The design should enable the congregation to decide on whether to proceed with the smaller building at the current budget, fund the larger building (presumably by using the endowment and additional fundraising), or do something else.

Memorial Garden - Lorraine Varney came to speak about the Memorial Garden Committee. The Memorial Garden, next to the Meeting House, is intended as a resting place for ashes of members and dear Friends of Old Ship. The garden offers a granite path where engraved names, birth, death dates of members and friends are listed. Ashes may be scattered in the garden or interred. Interment of ashes currently costs \$400 with an additional fee for engraving. The Board voted unanimously that Lorraine be named the next chairperson of this committee.

By-laws Updates - Jack Gomez and Mike Dwyer attended on behalf of the Trustees of Invested Funds. At May's Annual Meeting the congregation approved changes to Article XI of the Bylaws regarding the management of the endowment. Effectively, two funds – the Endowment & Deacon funds, will now be managed as one, and a third fund, the Saniter Trust, have 30% intended for Meeting House and 70% for Social Justice purposes. Previously these have been managed separately and Trustees of Invested Funds noted that the latter was not performing as well and therefore merging them would be more productive. This will establish a common distribution formula of the Saniter funds proceeds. The Saniter Trust is approx. \$100,000. The language, as suggested by the Trustees of Invested Funds, was unanimously approved by the Board. The changes to Article XI, Sections 1 and 2 shall read as follows;

"Section 1. <u>Definition</u>. The endowment shall consist of all the current invested funds of the Parish except for (1) the Deacons' Fund and (2) other such funds entrusted by organizations to the Trustees of Invested Funds for their management.

Section 2. <u>Purposes and Goals</u>: The endowment shall be composed of no more than three (3) funds one fund for investment management purposes which, in turn, will be comprised of several sub-funds, each of which have a special purpose. The current sub-funds to accomplish the following purposes:

- a) The Building Reserve Fund consists of designated gifts and bequests restricted for the purpose of preserving and maintaining the buildings and grounds of the Meeting House.
- b) The Social Outreach Reserve Fund consisting of designated gifts and bequests restricted for the purpose of benefiting charitable and humanitarian causes not directly connected to the Parish."

In addition, Mike Dwyer proposed a change in the language regarding the Deacon's responsibilities in Article VII, Section 3, in helping if needed to fill the pulpit. This section will now read: "Be responsible, in the event of possible vacancy in the office of Minister, for religious services, subject to approval by the Board of Trustees." This change was also unanimously approved by the Board. Both of these changes will be effective 09/30/25.

Building and Grounds: Vice President Janice McPhillips, acting as Board liaison of this committee, gave the following report: Old Ship's grant application to the Fund for Sacred Places was not selected to move along in the funding process. We were encouraged to reapply for the grant next funding cycle in 4 years. Unfortunately, the funding cycle for the grant does not align well with the

possible construction of a new Parish House and replacing the existing heating system of the Meeting House. The boiler that heats the steam that heats the Meeting House was inspected in August with no issues noted. Our Sexton Mark Curran oiled the floors of the Meeting House, as is his usual practice for the summer. Mark has not completed the repairs to the shed that we voted on last year but plans to attend to these repairs this fall. It was noted that this committee does not have a chairperson and that members are sorely needed. The Board strongly encourages members to please consider serving on this vital committee.

Treasurer's report: Treasurer Clayton Handleman submitted a report which included the following: *Stewardship*: Pledge fulfillment for the 24-25 pledge campaign is \$26,322 at 99.9% of the \$267,689 pledged and exceeds the \$258,789 used in the fall budget by over \$8,500. For FY 25-26 the budget anticipates \$265,000. As of September 9th we have received pledges in excess of \$271,000. If last year is a proxy then we can expect more pledges and a high percentage of fulfillment. *Book keeper*. We have hired a bookkeeper named Peg Mullaney. Peg has run a small bookkeeping business for decades, and has done book keeping at another church for over a decade. Peg and Clayton worked together over the summer on tasks such as getting her access to the Payroll service. Peg is now up and running but there is still some learning to do about all our church systems and methods. *Finance Committee:* Will begin meeting every 1st Thursday of the month at 7:00pm starting in October. It was agreed that an end of the year report for FY '25 is needed this Fall to share with the congregation.

September South Shore UU Gathering: On Saturday, September 13, Board President Trish McAleer, Vice President Janice McPhillips and Rev. Carie attended a UUA sponsored gathering of local UU Board and Ministers hosted by UU First Parish Norwell. Together with UUs from Cohasset, Norwell, Scituate, Duxbury, Kingston, and Plymouth we discussed areas issues relating to membership, religious education, finances, governance and stewardship. We shared about how we are "meeting the moment' in responding to the challenges facing UUs today. The Old Ship attendees felt the gathering helpful in increasing cooperation and building support between us and our fellow UU congregations here on the south shore.

Antiracism Drop in Book Group Meeting on October 19 at 7 p.m. on Zoom — All are welcome to attend our discussion of Why Black Men Nod to Each Other: Some Lessons and Observations on Life (A Memoir) by Bill Raynor. The book is described as a memoir that "offers an array of snapshots into his life. The reader is allowed to follow him from Boston's housing projects to the villages of Senegal. Race is a central theme as he provides context to how it intersects with every fabric of life. Bill explores his journey from teaching, coaching, entertaining and his work with young men of color. The book

explores the phenomenon of Black males' connection to each other through their shared experiences of intentional and unintentional institutional racism. Raynor offers personal examples from his time at a private catholic high school to his time at Dartmouth college and his long tenure as a college basketball coach and his experience as a Director of the Young Men of Color initiative." Ethan Torrey to speak on Supreme Court's Beginnings Saturday, October 25 at 3:00 P.M. Meeting House

We are honored to welcome Hingham native (and son of Elizabeth!) Ethan V. Torrey, who serves as the Legal Counsel of the Supreme Court of the United States. As such, he provides legal services to the Supreme Court as an institution, and support to the justices on a variety of case-related issues. Torrey also teaches a class on the History of the Supreme Court at George Washington University.

In recognition of the approaching 250th anniversary of the founding of our country, Ethan's presentation will focus on the Supreme Court and judicial independence in the early republic, from the Declaration of Independence to the Chief Justiceship of John Marshall.

A graduate of Hingham High School and the University of Pennsylvania, Ethan Torrey received an MA in History from Columbia University and his JD from Columbia University Law School. Prior to becoming Legal Counsel of the Supreme Court, Ethan was a partner at Choate Hall & Stewart LLP, an associate at Ropes & Gray LLP, and a Special Assistant District Attorney in the Middlesex County District Attorney's Office. Earlier he was a law clerk on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit and on the U.S. District Court for the District of Massachusetts. Torrey is an elected member of the American Law Institute. His deep knowledge and passion for the law translates into fascinating insights into this bedrock of American Government.
