Everyday Ordinary Theologies

We are now well immersed in our second year of transitional ministry. Many continue to ask: What is the work of transitional ministry? I appreciate that this can be a difficult concept to understand and internalize. I offer this refresher, with examples of transitional work in progress and an invitation for further engagement.



Transitional ministry invites us to pause—to look back with gratitude, access spiritual strengths, and identify areas for growth. It is a time for listening, discernment, and discovery. We keep asking:

- Who are we now?
- What do we value most about our shared life?
- What hopes and hungers call us toward our future?

Last year, the **Transitional Ministry Team (TMT)** provided a meaningful platform for sharing the history of First Parish in Hingham (Old Ship) and listening to one another. Through storytelling and listening circles, the congregation reflected on past accomplishments, moments of pride and joy, times of disappointment and pain, and aspirations for the future. These events allowed the community to celebrate the best of Old Ship and begin processing the more tender experiences. A Sunday morning grief ritual invited members to process and release pain and grief related to ministerial transitions, the Parish sale, and personal experiences. The **Social Justice Council (SJC)** demonstrated a commitment to historical stewardship with the release of the report, [“Black and Native American People in the Early History of Old Ship Church.”](#) Multiple worship services invited members to reflect on what it means to be truth-tellers and good allies/accomplices. In addition to providing opportunities for reflection and action specific to racial justice, the SJC is currently reviewing and reflecting on Old Ship’s land acknowledgment practices.

The **Worship and Music Committee (WAM)** continues to explore and support new models for worship, singing, ritual, and multigenerational engagement. An emerging **children’s spiritual exploration community** is asking: What do families need from us in these complicated times of parenting?

The **Board of Trustees (BOT)** has identified four priority areas: stewardship of building and grounds, leadership development, vibrant community (in-reach, out-reach), and financial responsibility. There is much to do. Small and large actions, thoughtful discussions, committee work, and stakeholders guide the way forward.

These ministries, and so many more, remind us that the heart of the congregation is not in a building or one minister, but in the **collective life we create together—the living heartbeat of shared ministry.**

Ministry belongs to all of us! It is how we embody our covenant with one another in times of joy and concern. It is the weaving together of our varied gifts, passions, and commitments in service to Love.

Shared ministry asks us to see First Parish in Hingham not as a place where a few lead and the rest follow, but as a dynamic community of mutual care and co-creation. The sacred work of this church—welcoming the stranger, nurturing the young, comforting the grieving, challenging injustice—is sustained not by one person or a few, but by the shared love and labor of many.

In this spirit, on January 17, 2026, the TMT will host a celebration of shared ministry. This day-long, all-congregational retreat will continue the exploration and discernment of identity, guiding values, and aspirations through the illumination of long-standing, emerging, and waning ministries. Come be a part of shaping the collective future of this beloved community.

In the meantime, look around the community, read the newsletters, and find a place to share your gifts, passions, and commitments. Step up to leadership. Lean in as a follower or worker bee. Be a part of this dynamic community shaping the future.

November Board of Trustees Update

On Wednesday, October 8th, the BOT met for its monthly meeting. Here are items of note;



Treasurer's Resignation – Treasurer Clayton

Handleman announced that, due to the demand of his professional commitment, he was resigning as Treasurer effective October 31. Former Treasurer Jack Gomez has agreed to serve as acting treasurer for the remainder of this church year. The Board thanks Clayton for all his work on behalf of Old Ship. Clayton also reported that 2024-2025 paid pledge fulfillment of \$267,842. This was more than the revised amount budgeted. Two thirds of Old Ship income comes from pledges, about 15% comes from the Endowment. Plate income is a smaller amount along with Merrie Market and other donations.

Community Space Team (CST) – Board liaison and acting chair Dennis Hogan reported the following; the focus of the committee is the preparation of a one-story option that will fit on the size of the parcel while affording the greatest amount of interior space. A primary concern for this configuration is the cost of parking, and whether a proposal with no or little parking can be approved by the Town. Team members Elaine Gomez and Laura Harbottle attended an October Hingham Planning Board meeting and had preliminary discussion about this option. The meeting was cordial though the Planning Board did ask if there was any way to include parking. Final plans will be developed to determine a cost estimate and bring the two options with costs to the congregation – likely in late November or December. CST will meet with the architect next week to discuss how to consider parking if the congregation wishes to go forward including it now or later. There have been four general contractors who have expressed wishes to bid on the project as well as an estimator.

Minister's Discretionary Fund - The Deacons, with input Rev. Carie and Jack

Gomez, developed a new policy to manage this fund that is consistent with general Unitarian Universalist Association guidelines and the needs of Old Ship. This was policy was voted on and unanimously approved.

Religious Education - Board Liaison Corey Fitz Marquez reported on a recent gathering as thirteen members met to discuss RE and brainstorm ideas for programs with a goal of weekly programming. Nina Wellford and Corey will co-lead the committee. Rev. Carie noted that Old Ship needed to adopt a safe congregations policy and Jennifer Lincoln agreed to investigate and present a draft.

Building & Grounds – Vice President/Board Liaison and Janice McPhillips reported that inspection just indicated that occupancy of the MH is 350 main floor and 195 in the gallery. It was agreed that Janice should develop some approaches regarding the oversight and follow up of annual inspections, including paid assistance.

This is especially true (though not exclusively) for gifts of securities or tangible property. It is modeled after similar policies at other congregations. RE is SET!

Well, it's getting there! We are happy to say that we once again have a committee dedicated to developing Old Ship's religious education program for children and families. **We're launching with a new name: Spiritual Exploration Team, or SET**, which we think



better reflects the needs of families in today's world.

Co-chairs Corey Fitz-Marquez and Nina Wellford are putting together the SET team that will build on the work already begun by Rev. Carie, lead teacher Addy, former RE Chair Trish and mentor Judi. The first goal is to create a core of 8 adults who can commit to one Sunday a month, so that we have two enthusiastic leaders with the children at 14 Main every week. If you would like to help in this way, please talk to Corey, Nina or Addy. We have simple and fun materials to use, and you will be partnered with an experienced lead to begin with. Many times a parent will also be present, so there is plenty of support. You'll need to be CARI approved as part of our safe community policy - a very simple process.

Many Old Shippers have volunteered in the RE program in the past - you know how rewarding it can be. Think about joining again, to support the delightful families we have with us now! We are also excited to be thinking about ways to serve the wider community as families search for ways to connect around spiritual values. At the Arts Walk on Oct 19, dedicated Old Shippers reached out to dozens of children and adults with a fun painting project and new informational materials about who we are as UUs. The SET plans to welcome all families with programs that are meaningful, supportive and fun. Please join us!!

"Everything is gonna' be all right."

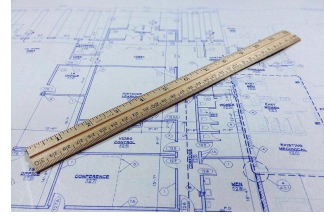
But a different, sometimes lonely place,

Community Space Team (CST)
November Update

Due to higher than expected estimates to build a two story structure, over the past few weeks the Community Space Team has been evaluating how to accommodate the essential functions of a Parish House in a one-story building. This would have a footprint of 40' x 50', slightly larger than the first version, and overall site work will be reduced. We expect to receive new estimates from contractors in the next two to three weeks which will help get a better sense of total costs.



Two members attended an informal discussion with the Planning Board and we are in the process of scheduling a similar discussion with the Historic Districts Commission. We have also reached out to Mass. Historic Commission and received some initially favorable comments.

As we have each November in recent years, our outreach/special plate offering this month will be for Friends of the Homeless of the South Shore. Given the increase in the need to provide shelter for families without homes throughout the Commonwealth and on the South Shore, and the decrease in government funding, there is even more need this year to support this group that provides shelters and housing for families in our area. Fire safety in "The Oldest Wooden Structure In Continuous Use In The Country" is something we are all aware of, at some level, whenever we enter the Old Ship Meeting House.

Thoughts have been turning to conversations turning to proposals turning to action and it's important this is a congregation wide conversation.

You may have noticed the new chalice in the front of the building, did you also notice the new base it's sitting on? The new base is larger and more solid, making those of us walking by it less concerned with accidentally knocking it over. On top of this more sturdy base is a larger chalice with the Candles of Joy and Concern actually sitting inside the fixture as well. The reason for this is the "sand-wax" and wicks being used. The wicks are sitting in wax that takes the shape of sand. If something were to happen and the larger base were to be knocked over, the sand wax is designed to cascade over the flame of the wick while falling, extinguishing the flame. Given that the floor of the Meeting House is oiled regularly, this added precaution felt like the right choice.



The chalice is not the only flame our Meeting House sees throughout the year and conversations have been continuing around the candelabras as well as the candles used during Vespers.

As Fall turns to Winter we are looking to see how a set of flickering electric candles look in the candelabras, and we do hope you share your thoughts with us as you see them being used so we can solidify choices for the future.

For Vespers, we are still brainstorming and would appreciate ideas from you all. The big question is, how do we honor the spirit of Vespers without the use of a live flame, other than that of the chalice? It's not an easy question.

Scam Emails and Texts

Scammers count on the fact you are distracted.

If a phone call seems weird or phishy, it probably is. Hang up immediately. An email went out supposedly from Reverend Caries asking for a request that requires confidentiality. Look at the email address. It is NOT Rev. Carie's email.

Always remember that Rev Carie would never ask you to purchase gift cards or send her a directory!
